








5:15 pm - Hostess Wilma Ferry announced that the food was ready, so Willie Sanders offered the prayer and led the pledge. The meal was a potluck with members bringing the food.

6:10 pm - In the absence of President Ron Albert, Vice President Gary Henrichs called the meeting to order. Since the secretary was absent, Gary suspended the reading of the minutes and asked if there were any additions or corrections, and since there were none, Willie made a motion to accept the minutes of the February meeting as printed in the newsletter, and Bob seconded. The motion passed.

Treasurer's Report – Wilma reported she had received more dues, and that was the only deposit. Nancy Whiddon added that she and Wilma are finalizing the new roster and will be sending it out as soon as they hear from the last few members who have not joined for this year. Wilma asked Gary if he had received any correspondence from those who have been contacted about membership, but nothing has come in. David Harris made a motion to accept the report, and Willie seconded it. Motion passed.

New Business – Anita Harris has added the Poor Boy Tour registration form on the website. Willie read a letter from the Richters with Alamo A's asking for a head count since we are only 26 days out from the Gonzales tour and discussed that the host hotel is full, but the Best Western across the street has trailer parking.

Old Business - David Harris brought up the topic first discussed last meeting about the meeting space and meals at the Ferrys, and even though it is so generous of them to offer a quiet place for the meetings and asking their son to cook for us, some members feel the location is just too far out for them to come. Others brought up the fact that the club cannot afford catered meals, and the members did not feel comfortable paying for the cost of catering based on meals planned versus attendance, which has been low this year. Several ideas were presented, such as changing the day and time of the meeting, and Anita gave her report on using the Victoria Public Library's free meeting rooms as an alternative. Since the library is not open on Sunday, she checked the availability of Saturday, April 13th and trying a new meeting time of 3 pm with no meal involved. This will be a trial run for this new meeting format, and if the club agrees to this new arrangement, she can book the room for a total of 6 times a year. Nancy pointed out that since it will begin in April, and we will have the December meeting/Christmas party at a restaurant, we will only have to find a few other meeting places, and they could be tied to an outing or a tour. The overall consensus was to try this next meeting and see how it goes. The meeting will be held at the library, and then members can travel to Dairy Queen or another designated place for a snack, eliminating the need for food to be brought in.

Tours: Tour Chairman Willie said he has several ideas for places to go for a tour, but he is waiting on dates from those offering a place. He explained the difference between a meet and a tour, and he emphasized that he is only interested in heading tours where members can drive their Model A's for a distance run instead of just meeting for a meal or an event.

Willie had received a question from the Austin club about who is responsible for the Autumn tour, and a discussion followed. Since our club planned the last tour that got cancelled due to weather, Willie expressed his

opinion that the Austin club should be in charge this year. Gary Henrichs suggested that the decision be tabled until the presidents of the two remaining clubs involved in this tour discuss the options.






2024 Dues



There are now 14 clubs from all over the state that are on the board. The arrangement with Good Guys this year is still on track. The parking fee of \$10.00 is for both the Pate and Good Guys event. There needs to be more care about the use and occupancy of golf carts and parts haulers due to liability issues. Currently there are 8,821 spaces sold. A contract with TMS is set until 2035.

A Brief History of the PATE Swap Meet

The Pate Swap Meet started out as the South-Central Swap Meet in 1972 when several car clubs in Texas decided that it was too much to keep going all the way up to Pennsylvania to Hershey when we could have a swap meet here in Texas. Among the starting members were Dr. Aggie Pate, Russ Gruenwald, Barney Calvert and others from the Gulf Coast Region AACA, car club in Houston. The "Pate" name is a tribute to Dr. Aggie Pate, founder of the Pate Museum of Transportation near Cresson, original home of this annual rite of spring. Pate, president of the Texas Refinery Company that

owned an employee recreation ranch southwest of Fort Worth, housed his private automobile collection in the museum. The inaugural swap meet was held in a rough semi-circle under trees across from the museum with about 350 vendors.

The Pate Swap Meet Association now consists of the 12 largest vintage car clubs in Texas, with the event serving the car restoration hobby and the collection of antique, vintage, and notable automobiles, and hot rods. Pate Swap Meet is the largest event of its type in the Southwest and second largest in the United States. Operations of the Pate Swap Meet have been located at Texas Motor Speedway since 1998.

Vendor-wise, the event is organized by street and block and space, allowing visitors to readily locate folks eager to deal inventories of the following: New Old Stock (NOS) car parts, Genuine Old Rusty car parts, complete (and typically grease-covered) V8 engines, front clips, hoods, grilles, tires, wheels, tools, steering wheels, antique and reproduction signs and gas pumps, license plates, emblems, manuals, diecast collectibles, assorted clothing and homemade Americana yard art. Motorcycles of various makes, and their parts, occupy their own space in the Pate landscape.

Just think that from a humble 350 vendors and 500 spaces to now over 4,000 vendors and a13,000 spaces in just 51 years is quite an accomplishment. We have increased our vendor spaces every year we have had the swap meet. We started out with just 4 car clubs putting on the meet to now 12 clubs of volunteers to keep this running. We have only missed one year since starting and that was 2020 and we all know what caused that.

Here's what you need to know about Daylight Saving Time in 2024 (DTS)

Participating states turn clocks forward an hour on the second Sunday in March during the spring. DST ends on the first Sunday of November in the fall of each year and that's when states turn clocks back an hour. Clocks fall back on Sunday, Nov. 3, 2024. Amtrak and the railroads were the main reason clocks change at 2am for DST. There were no trains leaving the station at 2am on Sundays in New York City when DST was established. Sunday morning at 2am was when they would interrupt the least amount of train travel around the country.

Hawaii and parts of Arizona do not participate in DST. The Navajo Nation is the one exception in Arizona. The territories of American Samoa, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands also do not participate.

States may exempt themselves from observing DST by state law in accordance with the Uniform Time Act, as amended.

Despite the Sunshine Protection Act being unanimously approved by the US Senate in 2022, there is no permanent end in sight. The bill was not signed into law by the US House citing other priorities that needed to be addressed before tackling DST. Thus, the bill has not been signed into law by President Joe Biden.


DST continues to fall flat with an emphasis on geographical issues rather than political party lines. A lot of people would like to not switch back and forth, we should just have standard or DST, but then they disagree over which one to enact. And so that's the problem. We need a consensus that if we're going to have one time, what is it? There seems to be no consensus on that. A 2023 version of the Sunshine Protection Act sat idle in the US House for the entire year.

Did DST start because of farmers? No, according to almanac.com. "Many Americans wrongly point to farmers as the driving force behind DST. In fact, farmers were its strongest opponents and, as a group, stubbornly resisted the change from the beginning. "When the war ended, the farmers and working-class people who had held their tongues began speaking out. They demanded an end to DST, claiming it benefited only office workers and the leisure class. The controversy spotlighted the growing gap between rural and urban dwellers."

The car remains in the same condition as restored by Red Grow in the 1950's. Enjoy driving "Betsy", your newest Model A, to your next cruise-in or car show. This is a truly historical vehicle, once owned by a MAFFI Hall of Fame inductee. "Betsy", became famous as the best Model A in the world. The Ford Model A has gathered 32 top place trophies in the 34 shows which the car was entered. That includes two national shows in 1957 and 1962.

Overall, the car won 39 trophies. It is said that Red Grow's car, "Betsy", was an inspiration at the time. It drove many people to do their best in restoring their own car. This urge to do the best restoration possible developed the need for more information about how to a better job. As a result, the Judging Standards evolved. We can thank Red Grow and the MAFCA founders for their vision. In 1967, Red sold "Betsy" to a Ford car dealer named

Dave Grubbs for \$5,000, an unheard-of price in those days. As a result, Dave Grubb placed the car in a glass cage centered in his dealer showroom. Tips from "the Know"

Technically Speaking XI

Spark plugs have always been a subject of conversation amongst car enthusiast. Model A fans are no exception. Which spark plug is the best for my Model A is usually the result of the discussion. Henry Ford chose to install Champion 3X sparkplugs in all new Model A's. The term "heat range regarding sparkplugs refers to temperature produced by the sparkplug at combustion time. Compression ratio and fuel mixture are factors in

choosing the heat range. The Model A Ford engine has approximately a 4.2:1compression ratio which is very low considering modem engines. And the fuel mix ratio is generally on the rich side. This calls for a spark plug with relatively high heat range. The 3X was an excellent choice.

While Champion 3X sparkplugs are still available but they are quite expensive. In the twenty-five-dollar range each. There are, however, alternative spark plugs that are available at a much lower price and can function as well as the 3X. The Champion WI8 is the closest match to the 3X and will perform equally as well.

Below is a picture of the most used sparkplugs in a Model A Ford.



The WI8 and 3X are shown side by side so that tip length can easily be compared.. Of course, with a high compression head the heat range can be slightly cooler than the 3X. Checking the performance by looking at the tip of the spark plug is a good way to determine which heat range performs best in your engine. A White tip is a plug too hot, Black tipis too cold. Brown/gray is just right.

MODEL A COUPE START-UP & IGNITION ISSUES

Our President, Gene Egert, was contacted by Amy Ruyle, whose husband was a previous member of the club. He had passed away recently and she requested help with his 1930 Model A Coupe. So, Gene called up Lindy and me to go forth on a Naper A's House Call.

All we knew was that the car had not been run in at least 5 years. Upon arrival, we viewed a very nice car up on jack stands. Other than a new battery, we scrutinized the car for a startup. After routine review, we began work with adding about 3 quarts of coolant. The gas tank was quite full. We gave it a fresh oil change, checked the timing, inspected the spark plugs, and installed the new battery.

When we first tried a start, there was no power at the points and no power to the spark plugs. Further investigation found the points badly burnt. Replacement parts were ordered. A week later, we returned and installed the points and made some timing adjustments. The car started and ran great. Gene took Amy for a quick ride and photos were taken to help her sell the car.

OW, the rest of the story....
et's begin with an electrical
and ignition system review.
In basic terms, the Model A has
two circuits supporting engine
operation. First the HIGH Voltage circuit which energizes the
spark plugs and the LOW Voltage
circuit that acts as a control circuit and power source. The High

Voltage circuit begins at the top of the coil mounted on the firewall, then via the coil wire to the distributor cap, thru to the rotor inside the cap, then through the distributor cap distributing power through flat copper connectors to the appropriate spark plugs.



Photo 1 shows an original type distributor where the condenser slides into a slot in the body of the base and it can be serviced without opening the distributor cap.

The Low Voltage path brings six volts to the bottom of the coil, then on to the dashboard ignition switch, then (through the ignition cable) to the inside of the distributor, ending at the points, which are assisted and protected by the condenser.

on engine rotation. When the points open and close based on engine rotation. When the points are closed, electricity from the battery flows through the primary windings in the coil and energize a strong magnetic field in the iron core of the coil. When the points open, a high voltage is produced that will jump the spark plug gap. The rotating crankshaft

is geared to the cam shaft, which in turn drives the distributor/oil pump shaft. On this shaft in the distributor is a 4- lobe cam. As this shaft rotates (one lobe for each cylinder) each lobe pushes the points open and the spring tension on the points forces them closed in between the lobes. The timing of the lobe opening the points must be in sync with the top piston position for each cylinder and the rotor rotation to deliver spark energy to the proper spark plug. To help manage the 6volt power arc or spark at the points as they open, the condenser plays a role to help manage this voltage and in turn it lengthens the life of the point contacts.



Photo 2 shows the NuRex top "new style" upper plate inside the distributor with the points and condenser.

Now back to Amy's car. The points were badly burnt and not functioning. Causes for this condition could include a bad condenser, the ignition was left on, or someone may have tried to start the car with a 12-volt charger, we just don't know.

This car had a NuRex updated distributor installed, so the

condenser had been relocated from the customary slot at the

bottom of the distributor body and is now inside the distributor, attached to the inside distributor plate holding the points. This parts conversion setup is made by NuRex and marketed by many parts houses. e had ordered matching
NuRex parts, and installed
new points on the car. Well, once
you have the ignition on, there
should be a small spark when you
take your finger and manually
open the points. We found no

such spark.

So, we took the distributor apart again and re-inspected our work, tried again, but still no spark. We checked all places in the Low Voltage circuit and found 6 volts where we should. We spent an hour reworking and rechecking both high and low voltage electrical circuits before discovering a simple culprit.

This small s-shaped piece of copper was the culprit. We removed the old upper and lower plates that had the burnt points and simply replaced with new plates. We had entirely missed transferring this copper strap from the old plates to the new




Photo 4 shows the Modern Plate Connector.

plates. This little copper connector is what transfers six volts between those plates. And, without it, we had no power to the points. Once we discovered this and installed the connector, within ten minutes we started the engine and it ran fine.

Perhaps a simple oversight but a huge learning experience!

Jim's Tech Tip by Jim Cannon, MAFCA Technical Director

While My Oil Gently Drains

Save Time by Working Smarter Every time you drain the engine oil to change it, while you are waiting for all the dripping to stop, may I suggest you add the following simple items to your oil change routine?

- Check the ignition point gap with a 0.020" feeler gauge. Adjust if required. Look at the points to make sure they still look good (not pitted or burnt).
- Wipe off the ignition cam with a rag. Now put a small dab of fresh cam grease on 2 of the lobes of the ignition cam.
- Put a drop or two of light oil in the little oiler on the side of the distributor. If you have the cam screw with the hole drilled in it, put a drop or two in there,
- Put a couple of drops of engine oil in each hole on top of the throttle assembly that is bolted to the back of the engine.
- Check the fan belt for tension.

That's it! In the time it takes for the oil to all drain out, you have taken care of several little routine maintenance items on you're "A" that will help keep it running well and avoid a problem on the road.

Tips from "the Know"

Technically Speaking XIII

Take a good look at me. I watch the temperature of the coolant in your engine. Normally I stay down near the bottom of my circle. I like it there because I know your engine is OK. When it is there the coolant is somewhere near 160 degrees. Give or take a few. But if you let your coolant get below where it should be then I will start to rise up so you can see me. I am trying to tell you that something is developing that could cause you to have a bad day. And, if you don't do something to put me back down where I belong I will raise up even higher. Ignore me altogether I may blow my top! In fact I know some of my fellow MotoMeters have literally hit the ceiling. They have taken on the appearance of a shuttle launch. I heard one fellow got his nick name changed to Geyser simply because his MotoMeter tried to look like "Old Faithful".

I work on the water vapors inside the cooling system. I really do not have to have my sensor in the coolant. Just in the vicinity of it. The vapors simply heat my sensor and I begin to operate. I like to be near the center of my small circle of my window. I don't mind it I am below it though. But if I start to rise above the center then you can bet conditions are getting ready to mess up your windshield as well as your firewall. You will be a lot happier if you don't let that happen.

If you will take care of your cooling system by making sure it is flushed annually and good coolant with anti-rust additives in it or antifreeze, I can almost go on vacation. But if you skimp on your radiator, like running one with less than adequate cooling capability then you better get prepared for an unpleasant event. And for heavens sake..spring for a leakless waterpump.

With coolant on your mind let me tell you the two kinds I like best. My preference is either Sierra or Prestone LowTox. Well, I will accept others if their base is Polly Propylene Glycol. You can almost be assured that if you use Ethylene Glycol I won't even get the chance to warn you because that stuff will cause the coolant to throw misty vapors out the system and all over your pretty paint job. Beside that I don't like it!!!


